



A, C, F, & J. THE CROSSAN'S M & A MARKET
101 Main Street, Yampa

The Crossan's M & A Market building was constructed circa 1902 in the Town of Yampa in the State of Colorado. The Crossan's M & A Market is significant to the development, heritage and culture characteristics of Routt County, including its unique location and familiar visual feature in the heart of Old Town Yampa. The commercial building is a False-Front Vernacular Storefront style of architecture with the characteristics of a concealed gable roof behind a false storefront with large display windows and a recessed entry. The structure sits predominately on the corner of 1st Street and Main Street and has remained since, without any major modifications for 100 years. The Crossan's M & A Market Building is also identified with several individuals who significantly contributed to the development of rural Routt County and the Town of Yampa. The property is most identified with the name of Robert R. Crossan, son of George Crossan, one of the first settlers to Egeria Park (today know as the Town of Yampa) in 1883. The Crossan's M & A Market was also fondly and formerly known as the Buck & Son General Merchandise Store, "*Where you can get All Kinds of Fresh Meats, Fruits, Vegetables and the Best of Everything in groceries. We do all kinds of work in our Tin Shop. Make our Store your Home*" as one of the advertisements in the *Yampa Leader 1906 Edition* read. The store was always an integral part of the heritage and culture for the Town of Yampa and the surrounding homesteads and ranches. General merchandise and groceries were always traded and brought to this location. Today, the Crossan's M & A Market is a landmark of cultural and historical significance owned by the Town of Yampa, awaiting its next reincarnation.
